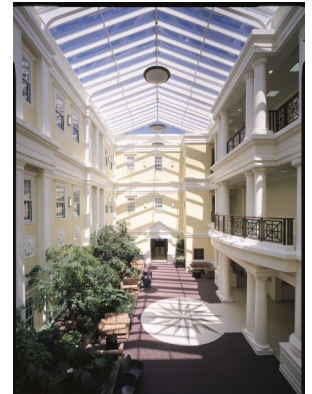
Registration Guide for Fall 2014 Courses

Registration for Fall courses starts this year on Tuesday, April 1 and goes through Friday, April 11. The Department of Sociology and Anthropology looks forward to working with you as you plan your schedule. This document should help you to do so, but it is not a substitute for an advising appointment, so please arrange to meet with your major advisor before registration.

Next semester, we have an assortment of electives to choose from. Back on the schedule after a brief absence is **ANT 340 Social Change in Latin America**. Taught by Dr. Bill Girard, this course examines the theoretical debates about development and provides empirical case studies to highlight how social change occurs in Latin America. Themes include: economic globalization, gender, migration, resistance to social change, urbanization, environmental degradation, corruption, social movements, structural adjustment, and race relations.

Other ANT electives include **ANT 240 Introduction to Epidemiology**, **ANT 245 Modern Arabic Society and the Media**, two sections of **ANT/SOC 372 Global Public Health** and one section of **ANT/SOC 373 US Public Health and Social Policy**.

We are also excited to present **ANT 112 Introduction to Archaeology** which is now a permanent addition to the list of department anthropology course offerings. In this course taught by Dr. Lisa Lauria, students will learn how archaeologists use the material remains of human activities to understand past human relationships, behaviors, and beliefs.



A new course on the Fall schedule is **ANT 401 Tutorial: Urban Ethnography** with Dr. Miriam Shakow. Dr. Shakow describes the course this way: “This course is for highly-motivated students who are interested in learning qualitative research methods and tracing the root causes of unemployment in Trenton.

Qualitative research is essential to understanding how the members of any group of people understand and respond to the challenges in their lives. ANT 401 is a Community Engaged Learning Course (CEL-II) course, and we will be “learning by doing,” acquiring the skills of qualitative social science by conducting hands-on research with several Trenton community organizations. Our research will focus on Trenton teenagers’ and young adults’ experiences in work and unemployment. Students in this course will gain skills in the most important qualitative research methods, including research design, participant-observation, qualitative surveys, semi-structured ethnographic interviews, life-history interviews, and focus groups.

Advising

Individual Advising

Students are strongly encouraged to meet with their faculty advisor before registering for classes. Drop by your advisor's office to sign up for an advising appointment time. Sign-up sheets will be posted starting the week of **March 17th** outside your advisor's office. Please be on time for your appointment and review the HSS "Advising Syllabus" you received over email. If you are unsure who your advisor is, open your student account in PAWS and check the right-hand column under ADVISOR.

Group Advising

A group advising session with Department Chair, Dr. Borland, and Program Assistant Karen Dubrule will be held on Tuesday, March 25 in Social Sciences 340 from 12:00-12:45. We will review general information to help you plan your courses wisely; this meeting complements your individual advising appointment with your faculty advisor, and is especially recommended for students newer to TCNJ.



Preparing for Your Advising Appointment

Before meeting with your advisor, review the HSS Advising Policy and your advising syllabus to know what is expected of you. For the meeting, print and bring with you the following items:

1. A tentative schedule of classes for Fall 2014
2. Your unofficial transcript from PAWS
3. Your academic requirements as listed on PAWS

**Remember that you must meet the following minimum grade requirement in the foundation courses before you may register for department core courses. You may register for core courses if you are currently enrolled in foundation courses, but be advised that your grades will be reviewed before the fall semester and if you do not meet the grade minimums, you will be de-registered from SOC301, SOC302 or SOC 499.

*Remember! You **cannot** register for classes with an academic hold until your advisor lifts it after an advising*

Featured Sociology Courses—Fall 2014

For Fall 2014, the Sociology and Anthropology department is offering an array of popular course options. For those interested in public health, Dr. Lynn Gazley will be teaching two sections of **SOC/ANT 372 Global Public Health**. As this course is cross-listed between the two departments, be sure to look for seats under both prefixes. Additionally, the department will be offering one section of **SOC/ANT 373 US Public Health and Social Policy**.

Professor Scarpati, Assistant Dean of Nursing, continues his teaching within the department with his course **SOC 365 Poverty and Welfare in the US**. If you haven't yet taken **SOC 205 Introduction to Social Work** and this is a career path you are exploring, then be sure to sign up for Professor Tom Swiatek's section. Embedded within this course is a 30-hour internship component which makes for an enriching experience.

For only the fourth time offered, **SOC 281 Sociology of Race in the US** is on the schedule and will be taught by Dr. Winnifred Brown-Glaude, who sits jointly within Sociology and African-American Studies Departments. This course is a broad sociological study of race in the dynamics of American power, privilege, and oppression.

Also back on the schedule, for the first time since Spring 2013, is **SOC 375**, Dr. Tim Clydesdale's course on **Religion in American Society**. Included in this course are some very interesting field trips to local spaces of worship as well as other various opportunities to observe and consider religion and American culture. Throughout the course students will learn how to apply the sociological perspective to religion in contemporary society.
